## The 'New' Abbey Opens its Doors

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- *'A' Level and GCSE results continue to break records*



August brought yet more good news for the Class of 2009. The Abbey Christian Brothers' Grammar School, Newry, celebrated yet another exceptional set of A-Level results.

The most significant statistic from these results was that more pupils at the Abbey obtained the top grades. Almost 50% of all results were grade A, 78% grades A or B and 93% grades A-C.

A total of 21 boys achieved 3 or more grade A's.

Eight pupils achieved 4 'A' grades. David Burns, from Warrenpoint, obtained his 'A' grades in Business Studies, Government and Politics, History and ICT. He has begun studying Law at Queen's University, Belfast. Christopher Cunningham, from Newry, obtained his 'A' grades in English Literature, French, Government and Politics and Psychology. Christopher is currently studying Politics, Philosophy and Economics at Queen's University, Belfast. Michael Doherty, from Jonesborough, obtained his 'A' grades in Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics and Physics. He has taken up a course in Veterinary Science at University College, Dublin. David Fitzpatrick, from Burren, obtained his 'A' grades in Biology, Chemistry, Geography and Mathematics. Following a gap year David will be studying Medicine at Queen's University, Belfast in 2010. Michael Lynch, from Dromintee, obtained his 'A' grades in Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics and Physics. Michael is currently studying Medicine at Liverpool University. Cathal MacDhaibheid from Newry obtained his 'A' grades in Biology, History, Irish and Spanish. He is studying Common and Civil Law with Spanish at Queen's University, Belfast. # GCSE RESULTS BREAK ALL RECORDS.

In early September, the fifth year students at the Abbey Christian Brothers' Grammar School, Newry learned that they had created their own little piece of history when they received their GCSE results. This group achieved a new record for the greatest number of students obtaining the top grades in GCSE examinations. Three years ago, 24 students achieved at least 8 'A' grades or above; this increased to 31 last year and has increased again to a magnificent 35 students this year!

'Top of the Class' was Jack Bradley with 12 A\*/A grades (6 A\* and 6 A's). Another eleven students achieved at least 11 A\*/A grades. They included: Patrick Burns, Dean Carolan, Kevin Gribben, Hua Jian Lui, Adam Magill, Callum McLoughlin, Paul McNulty, James O'Gorman, Conor O'Hare, Conor P O'Neill and Ryan Walsh. Hua Jian Lui achieved A\* grades in each of his eleven subjects.

Following the top performers above, fifteen students achieved at least 10 A\*/A grades, including: Stephen Beattie, Aodhan Byrne, Bernard Cooper, James Dickson, Stephen Doherty, Conor Doran, Cian Gallagher, Owen Jones, Mark McAlinden, Gregory McChesney, Daniel McCullagh, Garbhan McKeivitt, Dermot McVeigh, David Richmond and Conor Savage.

Mark Cox and Shane Finegan achieved at least 9 A\*/A grades and another six students achieved at least 8 A\*/A grades. They include: Gavin Donnelly, Ryan Kearney, Rory Keenan, Aidan McGauley, Conor McVeigh and Daniel Mullan.

Students chose three or four A levels from a range of 28 subjects available, including: History, Geography, Art, Drama and Theatre Studies, Business Studies, Economics, Accounts, Mathematics, Further Mathematics, Irish, French, Spanish, ICT, Chemistry, Physics, Biology, Design and Technology (Systems and Control), Design and Technology (Resistant Materials), Religious Studies, Government and Politics, English Language, English Literature, Physical Education, Music, Sociology, Psychology, Applied ICT and Construction.

A delighted Headmaster, Mr Dermot McGovern, thanked staff and parents and congratulated all the students who received GCSE results – not only the boys who had done exceptionally well, but also the boys who had done as well as they possibly could. He believes that a number of factors have combined to help with this year's success, including a very dedicated, committed and highly professional staff who got the best out of this year group. The most valuable gift any teacher can give a pupil in the Abbey is their own time and this was given in abundance.

## Marking the Move:

### PAST PUPILS RETURN TO BID FAREWELL TO COURTENAY HILL.

On Saturday 7th November 2009, a large number of past pupils accepted the invitation in the local and provincial press to avail of a final opportunity to walk the corridors of their Alma Mater, before it finally closed its doors on the 15th January. The open day was organised by a specially convened committee of Abbey staff, who have been tasked with 'Marking the Move' to the Castleown site.

Past pupils, representing generations of Abbey pupils arrived to relive some of their fondest memories of their school days and in some cases, meet up with former classmates. The committee was delighted with the attendance as a steady stream of past pupils trickled in when the doors opened at 10am. There to greet them were members of the Abbey's senior management team, as well as teachers past and present. Roll books dating back to the 1960s were available for pupils to be reminded of the names of their classmates, some samples of pupils' work, as well as a vast store of photographs, were all had available for the visitors to view. The photographs included: school football teams from the last four decades, school drama productions, trips and many other memorable events. One past pupil, who attended the Abbey in the eighties, and now lives in Belfast, decided to make his return to the Abbey as nostalgic as possible as he informed Sli na Mainstreach that he had even retraced the way he used to walk to school, including a stop off at Bennett's shop and a walk through the famous 'tunnels' under the New Road.



By the time the open day ended at 2pm, hundreds of past pupils had walked the corridors of the new school. In some cases several generations of the same family, who had all attended the Abbey at different stages were seen reliving past glories and stories.

There is a follow up day planned for those who attended this open day, when the past pupils will be given a tour of the New School building to view the new state-of-the-art facilities on offer.

The 'Marking the Move' committee is made up of: Mr J Rath, Mrs M Rafferty, Dr S Fee, Mr M Mc Mahon, Mr A O Rourke, Mr M Grogan, and Mr S Gallagher, plan to publish a commemorative booklet in May to mark this historic year for the Abbey.



# First Years tell their Ghost Stories

On a very stormy night in 1833 a large number of people flocked to the steamship, the Lord Blaney which was docked at Warrenpoint's north pier. It was one of the first steam powered ships that traded between Ireland and England.

There was a flurry of activity as both passengers and crew loaded the goods and livestock for the crossing. As the ship pulled away from the pier and the people on the dock waved and shouted goodbyes to their friends and family onboard some passengers felt wary of the voyage that they had started. As they crossed the open sea the wind rose to a gale and waves grew in size until they seemed like mountains compared to the ship.

All through the night the ship was battered by wind and water. In the very early morning the Lord Blaney came up to the mouth of the river Mersey but there was dense fog and so it was still nearly pitch black. Suddenly, there was a jolt and the boat immediately came to a stop, the masts snapped and the passengers were all thrown to the deck. The ship broke in half and the two pieces sank below the waves leaving no survivors except for a race horse called Monteagle who swam heroically to shore.

Ever since the Lord Blaney sank in 1833 people have claimed to have seen it. One person said that it was a calm and peaceful night on Carlingford Lough and the moon was shining. As midnight drew nearer, he and his friends saw a mist develop on the surface of the water and as the vapour of cloud moved towards Warrenpoint, masts and a funnel emerged from the depths until eventually the rest of a ship had appeared. As it sailed toward the docks it began to submerge beneath the waves again. At first the captain thought he had seen a ship going down but when he got to the place he had last seen the ship he found no wreckage. The older boatswain on the ship claimed it was the

ghost of the Lord Blaney.

The Lord Blaney appeared a number of times before and after each appearance. A few days later, other ships associated with Warrenpoint went down and more lives were lost. The Ghost Ship has become a messenger of death and destruction.


In the middle of the night the bride woke up and the room was freezing so

With the Abbey safely through to the quarter final, Jody Gormley gave a well earned rest to Armagh minor star, James Morgan, and the Abbey fielded with a few squad members staking a claim for a starting spot in the new year. Omagh proved that they are worthy favourites and powered to a comprehensive victory on a score line of 2-11 to 1-3.
